## **MEMORANDUM**

The complainant has filed a complaint of judicial misconduct against a judge of the United States District Court for the District of Columbia. For the following reasons, the misconduct complaint will be dismissed.

Complainant filed a civil lawsuit that was assigned to the subject judge. The defendant moved for summary judgment, and the complainant filed various motions. The subject judge denied the complainant's motions and ordered him to respond to the motion for summary judgment. Complainant alleges the defendant made false statements regarding certain documents that complainant submitted to the court, and the subject judge knew about the defendant's misrepresentations and should not have denied two motions filed by complainant. These allegations, however, are "directly related to the merits of a decision or procedural ruling" or otherwise "lack[] sufficient evidence to raise an inference that misconduct has occurred." JUD. CONF. U.S., RULES FOR JUDICIAL-CONDUCT AND JUDICIAL-DISABILITY PROCEEDINGS 11(c)(1)(B), (D); see 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(ii), (iii). Therefore, the complaint must be dismissed.1

Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 352(c) and JUD. CONF. U.S., RULES FOR JUDICIAL-CONDUCT AND JUDICIAL-DISABILITY PROCEEDINGS, Rule 18(a), the complainant may file a petition for review by the Judicial Council for the District of Columbia Circuit. Any petition must be filed in the Office of the Circuit Executive for the D.C. Circuit within 42 days of the date of the dismissal order. *Id.* Rule 18(b).
